Relational Apologetics Must Start With Us!

In discovering what obstacles may keep the nonbeliever from God, we should be diligent to discover what obstacles there may be in our *own* belief system or behaviors.

We must ask ourselves: "In what ways is God still unknown to me?"



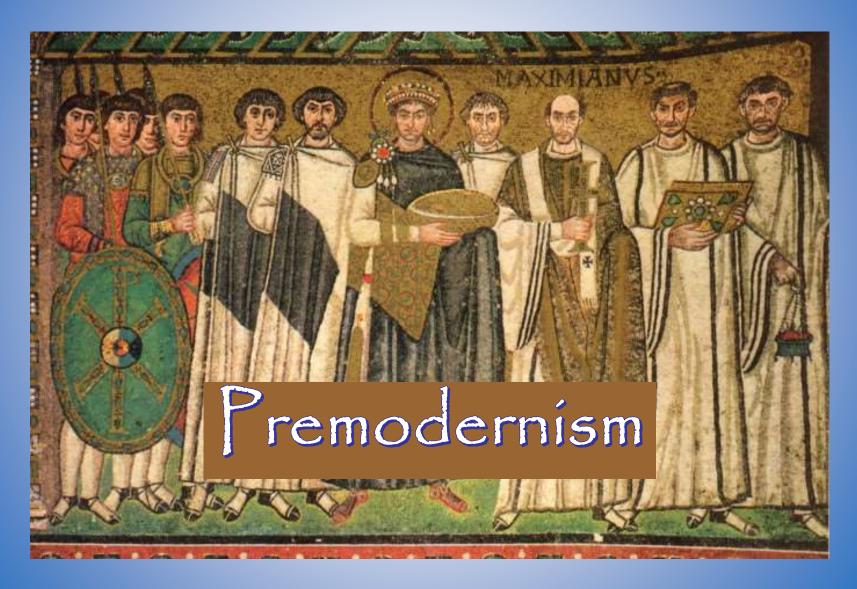
3 WORLDVIEWS

- Pre-Modern (creation to around the 1500s)
- Modern (the 1500s to the 1900s)
- Post-Modern (the 1900s to our present day)

3 WORLDVIEWS

Some qualifications:

- This is just a <u>very brief</u> overview!
- All 3 worldviews still exist today.
- Many belief systems can include a mix of all 3 worldviews.



PREMODERNISM

A few characteristics:

- Mysticism & Divine Transcendence
- A wide gap between the role of the church (the priest) and the common believer.

PREMODERNISM

How does God remain unknown?

- God is too far above me to be personal or to directly affect my life.
- God (or "the gods") may be fickle, selfish and must constantly be appeased.
- It's difficult to truly know God through the filters of human (or church) tradition.

Making God Known

The personal God of Scripture can be known within premodernism.

- God can satisfy the premodern search for transcendence and mysticism.
 - God is far beyond us! The Holy Spirit, the spiritual realm, are things we need to be wellversed in to experience God fully.

Making God Known

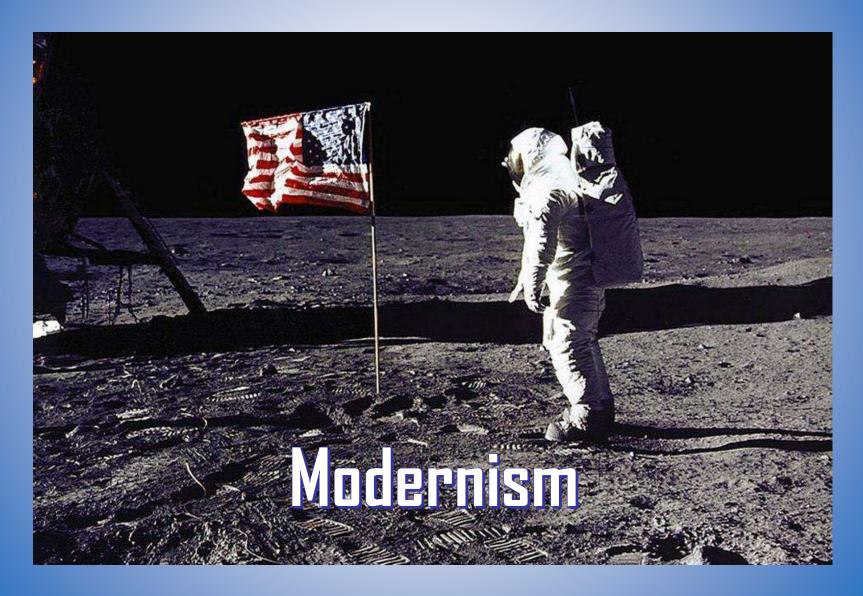
The personal God of Scripture can be known within premodernism.

- But, God has also come down to the realm of man to walk with us in personal relationship (the Bible, Jesus, etc.).
 - No superstitious appeasement of God is necessary.
 - There's no guesswork in how to please God!

Making God Known

The personal God of Scripture can be known within premodernism.

- But, God has also come down to the realm of man to walk with us in personal relationship (the Bible, Jesus, etc.).
 - And, while God absolutely uses the church and priests or pastors to guide his people, we can all access God directly and personally.



MODERNISM

A few characteristics:

- Focused on Logic & Reason
- Humanistic/Individualistic
- Focused on Progress (Production)
- Materialistic ('stuff', money, etc.)

MODERNISM

How does God remain unknown?

- There is no God. Only mankind & the world.
- If there is a God, he created the world and left it up to us to improve our lives.
- God isn't the ultimate source of wisdom & truth.
- It's difficult to truly know God through the filter of money and material things.

Making God Known

God can satisfy the modern value placed on material things, science, technology, logic, and on the potential for human progress.

Making God Known

The personal God of Scripture can be known within modernism.

However, these things must always be surrendered to the conditions of walking with him in personal relationship:

 We must surrender our minds and our methods to his wisdom and revelation.

Making God Known

The personal God of Scripture can be known within modernism.

However, these things must always be surrendered to the conditions of walking with him in personal relationship:

 We must look to the material things of the world (including ourselves!) to be transformed by the grace of God we experience in belonging to him.



POSTMODERNISM

A few characteristics:

- Truth is relative & personal (no absolutes)
- Hyper-individualism/consumer-focus.
- A pluralistic "buffet line" of beliefs.
- Attracted to the mystical ("virtual" reality).

POSTMODERNISM

How does God remain unknown?

- The God of Scripture is lost to my own interpretations.
- I can't experience real life in God's Kingdom if I'm always living in a virtual reality.
- I'll never know God through his church if my faith is a consumer preference.

 Jesus didn't expect people to believe in the absolute truth of Scripture before they witnessed that he was absolutely true.
